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Free programs for all ages at the DeLand Regional Library

The DeLand Regional Library, 130 East Howry Ave., offers a variety of free programs for children, teens, and adults throughout February. The library is open from 12 to 5 p.m. Sunday, 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Thursday, and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday and Saturday.

Black History Month Programs:

Zora Memorialized: 1 p.m. Wednesday, February 12. This presentation on Zora Neale Hurston will investigate the author's legacy by looking at three Florida cities—Eatonville, St. Augustine, and Fort Pierce—that have made special efforts to keep Hurston's memory alive. Zora Neale Hurston is recognized as one of America's finest twentieth century writers. Her books have inspired countless devotees to trek to Hurston sites seeking connection and inspiration—and has led to the author's memorialization by communities capitalizing on her celebrity. Presenter Leslie Kemp Poole is associate professor of environmental studies at Rollins College, Winter Park, Florida. A fourthgeneration Floridian, Poole's work focuses on Florida's environment. This talk is inspired by a chapter she is writing for a book about Hurston.

Inventing Change: The Legacy of African American Innovators: 1 p.m. Thursday, February 27. Join us for an engaging discussion featuring local historian Michael Brown, as he highlights the groundbreaking contributions of African American inventors throughout history. This informative session will explore the innovative minds and achievements of important historical figures whose inventions have shaped industries and changed lives. Don't miss this opportunity to learn, reflect, and celebrate these prominent African American legacies. Mr. Brown has studied local history for over 30 years. He is a frequent lecture on black history and related topics throughout the area, and more specifically at the DeLand African American Museum of the Arts.

Children and their caregivers are introduced to basic building blocks of literacy, in English and Spanish, through stories, rhymes and music, in a fun and educational environment. Programs may end with a brief S.T.R.E.A.M. (Science, Technology, Reading, Engineering, Art, and Math) activity.

Teen Programs: 4 p.m. Wednesdays. Those in grades 6-12 are welcome to crafts, games, and other activities. Contact the library for a schedule of teen programs.

Ready to Learn Pre-K Storytime: 10 a.m. Thursdays. Ready to Learn Pre-K Storytime is an interactive 21st Century literacy program designed for children ages 3-5 years old. Children and caregivers are introduced to a wide variety of kindergarten readiness skills through stories, rhymes, music, and motor activities, in a fun and educational environment. Programs will end with a brief S.T.R.E.A.M. activity (Science, Technology, Reading, Engineering, Art, and Math) or with skill development stations.

Wiggle, Giggle, Groove: 11 a.m. Thursdays. Wiggle, Giggle, Groove is an interactive physical literacy program. Children and caregivers are introduced to basic movements designed to build coordination, motor skills, rhythm and flexibility during this lively, music-filled program.

Quick Crafts: 4 p.m. Thursdays. Quick Crafts is a physical literacy program designed to develop fine motor and critical thinking skills. School-age children will tap into their creativity by constructing crafts from a variety of materials provided in the children's section. Supplies may be limited.

Gametastic: 4 p.m. Fridays. Gametastic is an interactive gaming program designed to maximize play as a means of developing critical thinking skills, social skills, or strategy skills. Children are introduced to various games and gaming techniques through exploratory hands-on activities in a fun and educational environment.
